John 1|1-18 | Introduction to Jesus

INTRODUCTION TO DISCOVERY BIBLE STUDY

Welcome to this study on the book of John. The study will follow the Discovery Bible Study (DBS) method, which encourages people to explore scripture through open-ended questions and discussions. The emphasis is on personal discovery, application, and sharing insights with the group. Typically there are three types of discussion questions: **observation**, **interpretation**, and **application**: what does it say; what does it mean; and how can I apply this?

As a group leader, your goal is to help each person in the group encounter God in community and discover their next step. As the group discusses scripture, listen for opportunities to ask follow-up questions and take the group deeper. Follow your curiosity. It's ok to go down rabbit trails that you think might lead to someone discovering their next step. It's ok to say "I don't know" if a difficult question is asked. It's ok to check references if someone is using a study Bible or if someone wants to search online. DBS leaders encourage the group to study the scripture together in community.

How does Discovery Bible Study fit into the strategy for small groups? Our small groups have always been designed to help people take next steps with God through living out the Acts 2 church model. Acts 2|42 says: *"They devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer."* During our weekly small group gatherings, we are devoted to practicing these four things in community.

Discovery Bible Studies help keep our discussion focused on the **Apostle's teaching** from scripture. These guides will help make sure your group is also devoted to prayer. As a leader, you'll need to make sure your group doesn't neglect breaking bread together or spending time building relationships with each other through fellowship as well. Over the next few weeks, we'll share a little about each of these four things our small groups are devoted to week-in and week-out.

ICE BREAKER QUESTION

What is your cooking 'specialty'? *Discuss how your group plans to share food together throughout the term.*

**Leader Note: Share the importance of your small group "breaking bread" together. This was one thing that the Acts 2 church was devoted to. They shared in Communion together and shared meals with each other in their homes. For groups... We recommend you have a meal or at least some snacks every week. Everyone should contribute. Some groups have a potluck every week. Others have people sign up to provide a meal or a snack for the whole group a few times each term.*

JOHN 1|1-18

Read John 1|1-18 aloud. Ask the group to note what stands out. Read John 1|1-18 aloud again, once again noting what stands out.

1. What stood out to you in the passage?
2. Was anything confusing?
3. What do we learn about God or ourselves from these verses?
4. How would you explain the opening of John's Gospel to someone else?
5. What changes or actions does this scripture prompt you to take?

**Leader Note: Make sure to record the next steps people identify. This will help you follow up, encourage, and hold your group accountable to follow-through with where God is leading them.*
